This is due to the fact that the name of the city and the kingdom of which it was the capital are a part of world history. The ruins of the city are highly distinctive and cover a very wide area. The giant stele, which may be approximately dated to the 3 rd and 4 th centuries A.D., and which include the largest monolith ever carved by human hands, give a remarkable appearance to this archaeological site. The study and preservation of these ancient relics (stele, buildings, sculptures, tombs, pottery of different kind, coins and inscriptions) is indispensable to our understanding of Ethiopian antiquity. The site does not merely contain relics from the 1 st millennium A.D. Mention should also be made of an 18 th century basilica which, besides being of historical interest, is a unique example of Ethiopian architecture. These monuments are consequently of outstanding universal value from the historical, artistic, and scientific point of view.	008
