4.2. Protective Measures

4.2.1 - Protective designation (legal, regulatory, contractual, planning, institutional and / or traditional) Note WHC (July 2012): Please carefully review, complete and update the information provided below.

The site is protected and conserved by an established framework of government legislation and protective designations and by local planning policies. The principal of these legislative measures is the 1980 Nature Conservation Act for Greenland. This act is the foundation framework for the protection of species, ecosystems and protected areas, although a new Act is now being prepared. Ilulissat itself is protected under the Greenland Home Rule Executive Order of March, 2003, and by the management plan adopted by the Municipal Council in 2002. A strong point in this Executive Order is its prohibition of any mining in the protected area.

2007 saw an amendment of the Executive Order to the effect that "Greenland Home Rule Government Executive Order No. 10 of 15 June 2007 on protection of Ilulissat Icefjord" now applies to the protected area/World Heritage Area.

4.2.2 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

An adequate legal framework for the maintenance of the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Authenticity and / or Integrity of the World Heritage property exists but there are **some deficiencies in implementation**

4.2.3 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate in the buffer zone for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

The property had **no buffer zone at the time of inscription** on the World Heritage List

4.2.4 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate in the area surrounding the World Heritage property and buffer zone for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

There is **no legal framework** for controlling use and activities in the area surrounding the World Heritage property and the buffer zone

There are **major deficiencies** in capacity/resources to enforce legislation and / or regulation in the World Heritage property

4.2.5.2 One Park Ranger, without other means of transportation than traditional dogsled, is employed to monitor a wilderness area of 4000 km2. The Park Ranger has no authority to issue fines. Only option is to report criminal offenses to the police, but due to lack of resources most cases ends up with no penalties.

A number of players cooperate on the management of Ilulissat Icefjord. The Heritage Agency of Denmark, on behalf of the Kingdom of Denmark, has overall responsibility for the World Heritage Area in relation to UNESCO and is in charge of liaison with UNESCO. The Agency for Environment and Nature of the Greenland Home Rule Government has national responsibility for managing the World Heritage Area. The actual management of the Area is undertaken in close partnership and dialogue with Qaasuitsup Kommunia.

Management is based on the provisions of Greenland Home Rule Government Executive Order on protection of Ilulissat Icefjord and the 2009 Management Plan. Responsibility for supervision of the World Heritage Area rests with Qaasuitsup Kommunia.

4.3.3.2 The coordination between local and Greenlandic national level is good. The coordination involving Denmark as official state party is more complex. From a local perspective, Ilulissat/ Greenland is not always regarded equal partner, compared to the other Danish sites (i.e. lack of funding in common projects). This relationship will be strengthened if the national level (Denmark) takes greater account of the specific conditions in Greenland when searching funds or arranging meetings.
