Comment

The inscription includes the ancient city (Pythagoreion) and the classical Sanctuary of Hera (Heraion). In the nomination file, Heraion's core zone was declared in a descriptive way, without delimitation of its exact boundaries. According to the description of the property, the inscribed area refers to the excavated monuments related to the Sanctuary of Hera. During the Retrospective Inventory, though, the map of Heraion shows as core zone the overall designated archaeological site (382.45 Ha), without any distinction between core and buffer zone. Also, the year of inscription (1992) needs to be added to the Information Table.

2.3 - Attributes expressing the Outstanding Universal Value per criterion

Criterion (ii): The temple of Hera at Samos is fundamental to an understanding of classical architecture. The stylistic and structural innovations in each of its successive phases strongly influenced the design of temples and public buildings throughout the Greek world. The technological mastery of the Eupalinus' tunnel similarly served as a model for engineering and public works. Criterion (iii): Samos was the leading maritime and mercantile power in the Greek world in the 6th century BC, and this importance is reflected in the extent and richness of the archaeological remains, which are largely untouched by subsequent development. Pythagoreion and Heraion of Samos bear eloquent witness of the Ionian spirit. During its apogee in the 6th century BC the ancient city of Samos achieved exceptional technical and artistic progress and created innovative methods and works, thus representing a city with a high level of civilization, which merits its inclusion in the Ionian Dodekapolis.

The Ministry of Culture is the competent body supervising the sites and overseeing all works carried out. As far as the safeguarding of cultural and natural heritage is concerned, there are cases where other competent bodies besides the Ministry of Culture are involved. The Ministry of Culture sets out the guidelines and the general policy for the management of the monuments and sites, which is then implemented by the competent Ephorates.ä

In the case of Pythagoreion and Heraion of Samos the 21st Ephorate of Prehistoric and Classical Antiquities is responsible for the management and protection of the monuments. The responsibilities of the Site manager have been added to an existing job.

The current management system is considered sufficiently effective.

In the nomination file, Heraion's core zone was declared in a descriptive way, without delimitation of its exact boundaries. According to the description of the property, the inscribed area refers to the excavated monuments related to the Sanctuary of Hera. During the Retrospective Inventory, though, the map of Heraion shows as core zone the overall designated archaeological site (382.45 Ha), without any distinction between core and buffer zone.
