Total area of Bangladesh part of Sunderbans is 580000 hectares of which 139699.496 ha (inclusive of 48670 ha water area) was declared as wildlife sanctuary vide MOEF's notification no S-3/7/96/147 dated 6.04.96 under Article 23 (1) (2) of Bangladesh Wildlife Preservation Order 1973 amended by Bangladesh Wildlife (Preservation) (Amendment) Act, 1974.
