The medium capacity on management to respond is caused by not enough ability related to funding sources and human resources comparing with the large area.

There is no buffer zone, but there is a need for one

The boundaries of the World Heritage property **do not limit** the ability to maintain the property's Outstanding Universal Value but they could be improved

The property had no buffer zone at the time of its inscription on the World Heritage List

4.1.4 - Are the boundaries of the World Heritage property known?

The boundaries of the World Heritage property are known by the management authority but are not known by local residents / communities / landowners.

4.1.5 - Are the buffer zones of the World Heritage property known?

The property had **no buffer zone** at the time of its inscription on the World Heritage List

4.1.6 - Comments, conclusions and / or recommendations related to boundaries and buffer zones of the World Heritage property

There is a legal frame work for national park buffer zone to protect the conservation area (Law No. 41-1999). However it is not yet implemented. This zone which contains both forested and non-forested areas could potentially be used as the property's buffer zone also.

4.2. Protective Measures

4.2.1 - Protective designation (legal, regulatory, contractual, planning, institutional and / or traditional)

Comment

The property is under Indonesian law because it consists of three national parks.

4.2.2 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

An adequate legal framework for the maintenance of the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Authenticity and / or Integrity of the World Heritage property exists but there are **some deficiencies in implementation**

4.2.3 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate in the buffer zone for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

The property had **no buffer zone at the time of inscription** on the World Heritage List

4.2.4 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate in the area surrounding the World Heritage property and buffer zone for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

An adequate legal framework exists for the area surrounding the World Heritage property and the buffer zone, but there are some deficiencies in its implementation which undermine the maintenance of the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Authenticity and / or Integrity of the property

4.2.5 - Can the legislative framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) be enforced?

There are **major deficiencies** in capacity/resources to enforce legislation and / or regulation in the World Heritage property

4.2.6 - Comments, conclusions and / or recommendations related to protective measures

Even though the national parks have a legal status under Ministry of Forestry decree, they may need a higher status (such as government regulation or presidential decree).

4.3. Management System / Management Plan

4.3.1 - Management System

Comment

Three national parks follows the zonation planning that consists of core zone, wilderness zone, utilization zone, rehabilitation zone, and others. Although it is one world heritage property, it consists of three national parks that are managed separately. They still no appointed coordination body for an integrated monitoring/law enforcement/etc.

4.3.2 - Management Documents

Comment

There are planning documents for three national parks that consists of long term, medium term, and short term strategic planning. There is an action planning that separately related to the national park management from 2007, but it is not yet integrated to be one emergency action for the whole property.

provincial / state; local / municipal etc.) coordinate in the management of the World Heritage Property?

There is coordination between the range of administrative bodies / levels involved in the management of the property **but it could be improved**

The management system/plan is only **partially adequate** to maintain the property's Outstanding Universal Value

4.3.5 - Is the management system being implemented?

The management system is only partially being implemented

An annual work / action plan exists and **most or all activities** are being implemented and monitored
