Installation of the protective shelter for some outstanding elements is the other protective measures implemented by the site administrative team.

A separate unit has been created for field management within ICHO, namely *The Directorate of the Takht-e Suleiman Development Project*. The purpose of this unit is to give impetus to the decision making mechanism and integrate the activities of various departments, following the example of the successful project scheme at Zogha Zanbil. A five-year management plan has been adopted for Takht-e Suleiman, in 2002.
