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#### 3. Statement of Outstanding Universal Value

#### 3.1 - Statement of Outstanding Universal Value for the property as adopted by the World Heritage Committee

#### Déclaration de valeur universelle exceptionnelle

Brève synthèse

Au carrefour de plusieurs routes commerciales depuis le Ile millénaire av. J.-C., Alep a successivement subi la domination des Hittites, des Assyriens, des Akkadiens, des Grecs, des Romains, des Omeyyades, des Ayyoubides, des Mamelouks et des Ottomans qui ont laissé leur empreinte sur la ville. La Citadelle, la Grande Mosquée du XIIe siècle et plusieurs madrasas, palais, khans et bains publics des XVIe et XVIIe siècles composent la trame urbaine cohésive et unique de la ville.

La monumentale Citadelle d"Alep, qui s"élève au-dessus des souks, des mosquées et des madrasas de la vieille ville fortifiée, témoigne du pouvoir militaire arabe du XIIe au XIVe siècle. Rappel de l'occupation passée de civilisations remontant au Xe siècle av. J.-C., la Citadelle abrite les vestiges de mosquées, d'un palais et de thermes. La cité fortifiée qui s'est développée autour de la Citadelle conserve son ancien quadrillage de rues gréco-romain, ainsi que des vestiges de bâtiments chrétiens du VIe siècle, des murailles et des portes médiévales, des mosquées et des madrasas rappelant les aménagements ayyoubides et mamelouks de la ville, et des mosquées plus tardives de la période ottomane. À l'extérieur des murs d'enceinte, le quartier de Bab al-Faraj au nord-ouest, le quartier de Jdeïdé au nord, et d'autres quartiers au sud et à l'ouest, qui datent de ces périodes d'occupation de la ville fortifiée, contiennent d'importants monuments religieux et des belles demeures. Certaines parties de la ville ont subi des changements fondamentaux au cours des 30 ans qui ont précédé l'inscription : destruction de bâtiments, construction de nouveaux bâtiments en hauteur et élargissement des rues. Néanmoins, l'ensemble qui subsiste avec ses principaux bâtiments et la cohérence du caractère urbain des souks et des rues et ruelles résidentielles contribuent tous à la Valeur universelle exceptionnelle.

Critère (iii): La vieille ville d''Alep témoigne de la richesse et de la diversité de ses occupants successifs. De nombreuses périodes de l''Histoire ont imprimé leur marque sur le tissu architectural de la ville. Des vestiges de constructions et d''éléments hittites, hellénistiques, romains, byzantins et ayyoubides sont intégrés dans la Citadelle massive qui subsiste. Le mélange de différents bâtiments -, dont la Grande Mosquée fondée sous les Omeyyades et reconstruite au XIIe siècle, la madrasa Halawiyé du XIIe siècle, intégrant des vestiges de la cathédrale chrétienne d''Alep, ainsi que d''autres mosquées et madrasas, des souks et des khans - témoigne de manière exceptionnelle des aspects sociaux, culturels et économiques de ce qui fut l''une des villes les plus riches de l''humanité.

Critère (iv): Alep est un exemple exceptionnel de ville ayyoubide du XIIe siècle avec ses fortifications militaires, élément essentiel édifié après la victoire de Saladin sur les Croisés. Les douves et le mur défensif surplombant un glacis massif pavé et escarpé, et la grande porte avec son système de mâchicoulis, constituent un ensemble de premier ordre d'architecture militaire, à l'apogée de la domination arabe. Des ouvrages des XIIIe et XIVe siècles, dont les grandes tours et le pont d'entrée en pierre, renforcent la qualité architecturale de cet ensemble. Aux abords de la citadelle, à l'intérieur de la ville, on trouve de nombreuses mosquées de la même période, dont la madrasa el-Firdaws, construite par Daifa Khatoun en 1235.

Intégrité (2009)

Les limites du bien suivent la ligne des murs d'enceinte de la vieille ville et de trois quartiers extra-muros : le faubourg nord, et les quartiers nord-est et est. Certains attributs caractéristiques se trouvent en dehors des limites et devraient être protégés par une zone tampon.

Bien que la Citadelle domine toujours la ville, l'aménagement hôtelier de huit étages du quartier de Bab al-Faraj a eu un impact négatif sur son intégrité visuelle, comme c''était déjà le cas pour de précédentes interventions réalisées avant l'inscription. Il importe de respecter ce qui subsiste de cohérence du tissu urbain, et de remédier en permanence à la fragilité de ce tissu et des vestiges archéologiques, malgré l'absence de conservation.

Authenticité (2009)

Depuis l'inscription, le plan de l'ancienne ville par rapport à la Citadelle qui la domine est demeuré dans l'ensemble inchangé. Les efforts de conservation menés dans la vieille ville ont en grande partie préservé les attributs de Valeur universelle exceptionnelle. Néanmoins, le cadre est particulièrement vulnérable en raison de l'absence de mécanismes de contrôle au sein des services d'urbanisme, et notamment de l'absence de zone tampon. Les activités historiques et traditionnelles liées au commerce et à l'artisanat se maintiennent et constituent un élément essentiel du maintien de la vie urbaine traditionnelle de l'endroit.

Besoins en matière de protection et de gestion (2009)

La ville est protégée par la législation sur les Antiquités contrôlée par la Direction générale des Antiquités et des Musées (DGAM).

En 1992, le Projet de réhabilitation de la ville ancienne d''Alep a été mis en œuvre par la Municipalité d''Alep, en collaboration avec des organismes internationaux. En 1999, la Municipalité d''Alep a créé le Directoire de la vieille ville pour aider à la réhabilitation des vieux quartiers. Ses trois départements sont respectivement chargés des études et de la planification, des permis et du suivi, de la mise en œuvre et de l''entretien. Le bureau du Directoire de la vieille ville prépare actuellement un plan d'ensemble de l'évolution de la ville. L''aménagement de la ville est étudié dans le cadre du Programme pour l''aménagement urbain durable en Syrie (UDP), réalisation commune d'agences internationales, du Ministère syrien pour l''Administration locale et l'Environnement et d'autres institutions syriennes partenaires. Ce programme aide à la mise en valeur de compétences pour la gestion et l'aménagement urbains durables au niveau national et municipal ; il inclut également un volet de soutien à la réhabilitation de la vieille ville.

Il importe d'encourager des démarches traditionnelles en matière de conservation, restauration, réparation et entretien du bâti. Il faut aussi mettre en place un plan de conservation d'ensemble incluant une réglementation d'urbanisme sur la hauteur du bâti et la densité des nouveaux aménagements dans des zones précises, ainsi qu'une politique générale de protection des vestiges archéologiques mis au jour lors de travaux infrastructurels et d'aménagements. Il faudrait aussi créer une zone tampon imposant des contraintes d'urbanisme appropriées.



Since liberation, the Ancient City of Aleppo work through the many challenges of recovery such as dealing with leveraging existing and newly acquired resources, negotiating differing community desires for restoration, and dealing with portions of the community that have returned to normalcy quickly or were never affected. Recovery operations began immediately after a liberation, concurrent with response operations such as debris clearance, damage/impact assessment.
