Hebron/Al-Khalil Old Town possesses a high level of legal protection, both at the national and local levels. At the national level, it is protected by the law on Tangible Cultural Heritage (No. 11, 2018) for the protection, conservation and management of tangible cultural heritage in Palestine. At the local level, protection of the property is based on the municipal physical master plan for the city of Hebron and the "Hebron"s Old City: Preservation and Revitalization Master Plan 2015-2040",
