Updated Progress Report

Kathmandu Valley World Heritage Site was inscribed on the World Heritage List in 1979 in the form of a single World Heritage Site consisting of the seven separate Monument Zones such as three royal palace complexes of Hanuman Dhoka, Bhaktapur and Patan Durbar squares, two Hindu temples complexes i.e. Pashupati and Changu Narayan and two Buddhist stupas i.e. Swayambhu and Boudha.

These seven Monument Zones are situated in the city core areas. It includes hundreds of public and private monuments, sculptures, traditional stone water spouts dated back to the early century A.D. Kathmandu Valley World Heritage Site, is the living cultural heritage site. It is very large in size and complex in nature in comparison to the other World Heritage sites.

Nepal is a developing country. The rapid economic changes, tremendous population growth and uncontrolled urban development have brought a great change in the society. It has also affected to the general environment of the seven monument zones of the Kathmandu Valley World Heritage Site.

In November 1993 a joint UNESCO/ICOMOS Mission was under taken in the Kathmandu Valley World Heritage Site. The mission specified 16 points of concern. Since then (1993) HMG/N has taken extensive measures for the protection of the KVWHS and made progresses on 16 points. In this regard several updated monitoring reports have been submitted to the World Heritage Committee.

As per the decision of the 21st World Heritage Committee meeting of 1997, again a tripartite mission of UNESCO/ICOMOS and HMG/N, March-April 1998 have reviewed the management of this site and agreed 55 recommendations with time Bound Action Plan incorporating the 16 points specified in 1993.

The major activities among the 55 recommendations are to strictly implement the protective bye-laws controlling the demolition of historic buildings and the design of the new structure, to resolve the overlaps in the prevailing Act, establishment of a HCU, preparation of the Master Plans, inventory of monuments and its classification, establishment of a Monument Conservation Fund, approval of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Rules 3rd Amendment, fix stone boundary markers and plaques etc.

On the above mentioned recommendations HMG/N has already completed most of the Time Bound Action Plans. The ongoing recommendations are also enhanced such as: established the Heritage Conservation Unit, approval of the 3rd Ancient Monument Preservation Rules established a separate Ancient Monument Preservation Fund, prepared a Master Plans for WHZs except Hanuman Dhoka. A Master Plan for the Bhaktapur Monument Zone is under preparation. The fixing of stone boundary markers and plaques at all monument zones have already been completed. Government has granted special facilities to those house owners who built or repair their houses as per the approved design, classification of the monument is underway. Government is implementing strictly the bylaws to control the demolition of historic buildings. Consent for dismantle is provided only as a last resort to

those buildings which are in a very dilapidated conditions or which aren't technically possible to do in situ repair or restoration. People are now easily accepting to use traditional material in their houses which is clearly mentioned in the latest technical report of ICOMOS expert. As a result, now Protected Monument Zones are better organized, look cleaner and beautiful than pre 1993.

The single over riding issue raised by ICOMOS in the UNESCO/ICOMOS/HMG/N joint mission report for protecting the integrity of the KVWHS is the control of demolition of historical structure and illegal development. ICOMOS expresses that the religious public monuments are secure. However, the traditional private houses and commercial building are subject to extreme development pressure.

As per the decision of the 23rd World Heritage Committee meeting which was held in Marrakesh, a High Level Mission including the honorable chairperson has visited the Kathmandu valley World Heritage site from 24th September to 30th, 2000. This High Level Mission has discussed with the higher authorities of HMG as well as local authorities and other concern institutions and other line agencies about the importance of Cultural Heritage of the Kathmandu Valley World Heritage sites and its present situation. During their visit, Right Honorable Prime Minister Girija Prasad Koirala and other concern Honorable Ministers of Nepal have discussed with the High Level Mission seriously about the state of conservation of Kathmandu Valley World Heritage site. During the discussions the authorities of HMG and concern Municipalities have assured to the high level Mission of their strong commitment to preserve and protect the KVWHS as per UNESCO World Heritage Convention. His Majesty the King Birendra Bir Bikram Shahdeva has graciously granted the audience to the High Level Mission.

The High Level Mission's visit including Honorable Chairperson of the World Heritage Committee proves that how serious is the World Heritage committee for the preservation of Kathmandu Valley World Heritage site. After the inspection of the seven Monument Zones of Kathmandu Valley WHS the High Level Mission must have realized how complicated, complex and large is the site, together with the Government, Municipalities, other NGO and local and private people's effort to preserve the Kathmandu Valley and its coming up awareness among the people, various institutions.

To control damaging and illegal development it urgently needs technical as well as financial resources. By realizing its sensitivity and importance the HMG of Nepal has already created a 18 man Heritage conservation Unit-This unit will immeasurably strengthen the capacity of the Government to manage and monitor the WHS, although time must be allowed to produce the desired results given the size and complexity of the site. Realizing its seriousness, sensitivity and importance of the Kathmandu valley WHS for its better management the government of Nepal has recently transferred the Heritage Conservation Unit from the Ministry of Culture, Tourism and Civil Aviation to the Department of Archaeology. Immediately after the transfer of HCU in the DOA, the existing organization chart of DOA has also been improved. As per the new organization chart, the existing Protected Monument Zone conservation sub-section is uplifted to the section such as World Heritage conservation section, the chief of this section is now the Gazeetted 2nd class officer. Under this section comes the HCU. This section is now fully responsible to train the staffs, monitor and evaluate the World Heritage site.

The three Municipalities of the Kathmandu Valley have already established a separate HCU with trained technical manpower. Now from the local level too more seriousness and responsibilities are taking on the conservation of the cultural heritage within the Protected Monument Zones.

To control the illegal development within the Protected Monument Zones in Patan, a special joint monitoring team consisting of the representative of DOA, Lalitputr submetropolitan UDLE, District Administrative Office and Town Development committee monitoring the Patan Monument zone once in a week. This team while inspecting the site can give the direct order on the spot to stop the illegal construction to the house owner if he is out of the approved design of prevailing Act. This team is created under the chairmanship of the Mayor himself.

For the management and protection of the Changu Narayan area a special monitoring team is formed under the chairmanship of the Chief of the Bhaktapur Palace Conservation and Monument Maintenance Office consisting of the chairman of the Changu Narayan Village Development Committee. With the support of UNESCO a project based on the a detail documentation of the monuments, guide training at site and restoration of a private house are launched at Changu Narayan.

Most of the major conservation and environmental protection activities are carrying out by the Swayambhu Conservation and Development Committee under the technical guidance of the DOA. A major project i.e. in situ restoration of the Sabyaguha Bihar has been completed. This project was done under by the Department of Archaeology the joint financial collaboration of UDLE, the house owner, and Swayanbhu Development and Conservation Committee. In this way further in situ restoration activities will be launched in the coming years too.

The Pasupati Development Trust is actively carrying out the responsibilities of protecting the Pasupati World Heritage Site in full cooperation with DOA.

Bhaktapur municipality itself is very aware of the building control. The addition to the government facilities, the Bhaktapur municipality also has allocated a lump sum of money to make available of construction materials. A Master Plan for the Bhaktapur Monument Zone under preparation.

Annual budget of the government. for the conservation and preservation of the Cultural Heritage is increasing considerably. In addition, NGO's, INGO's, Donor countries, municipalities and private parties are also increasingly involved in these activities.

For creating public awareness on the heritage conservation, related government. line agencies , municipalities, local people and NGO's are actively conducting different programs in different levels in close cooperation with UNESCO, donor countries and INGOS .

In the school level curriculum, a culture education is endorsed from 1-10 classes.

Public awareness on the conservation of cultural heritage does not come in a day. It takes time and patience. Through different line ministries, municipalities, NGOs, INGOs, UNESCO, private parties various public awareness. programs on conservation of Cultural Heritage are continuously implementing and these days awareness among the people on the importance of the Cultural Heritage is coming up slowly and steadily.

ICOMOS expert in his report Oct-Nov. 1999 states that the design of new buildings within the WHS has improved. But the permits for demolition is still continuing.

The outstanding concern of the government now will be focussed on the remaining concern of ICOMOS expert i.e. control of damaging the traditional houses.

To control it too, necessary steps have already taken by the government. Under the provision of the Ancient Monument Preservation Act, special criteria have already been fixed for the classification of the monuments, within the WHS. The classification of monuments, within WHS is already implemented at Patan and Bhaktapur monument zone. This step will support to control on the demolition of traditional buildings as well as improve the conservation standard.

The Fourth Review Committee Meeting of the International Campaign for the Safeguarding of the Cultural Heritage of Kathmandu Valley, which was held in Kathmandu in July, 1999 appreciated the outstanding achievements on the conservation, preservation and management of the Cultural Heritage done by the Government in close collaboration with UNESCO, since the last Campaign Meeting and also recommended to draw up a Strategic Action Plan for the 21st century and to expand the committee into a National and International Campaign Advisory Committee, In this regard the forth-coming meeting is proposed to be held in the beginning of the year 2001.

Conclusion

Nepal is not a rich country and like most developing countries is affected by rapid social and economic change, which put pressure on traditional environments and lifestyles, especially since most of the World Heritage Sites forms part of living cities. Nevertheless, since 1993 HMG has made tremendous progress for the preservation of the authenticity and integrity of Kathmandu Valley World Heritage Site. HMG is cooperating with the other stakeholders to implement an extensive and diverse program of enhanced management and protection for the KVWHS, in close cooperation with UNESCO. These combined measures will ensure the protection of the integrity KVWHS for future generations of humankind.

It should be recognized that in developing country i.e. Nepal, pressures will inevitably be greater than in a developed country where such rapid change occurred in the past and where unchallenged conservation strategies are more easily secured.

The government is taking all the possible efforts for the preservation and conservation of the World Heritage Site MZ. That efforts are still continuing. We are happy to note that the High Level Mission in its report to the Committee has sincerely and faithfully reflected the views, commitment, and progress made by Nepal in conservation and preservation work. We welcome the positive note of the report and thank the leader and members of the mission for their sincere efforts. Nepal will look forward to receive any suggestions for the expeditious implementation of the 1998 recommendations to attain our common objective, the historical integrity of the Kathmandu Valley World Heritage Site.

Time-Bound Action Plan of Corrective Measures for implementing the Recommendations of the UNESCO/ICOMOS/HMGN Joint Mission

The Recommendations formulated and adopted by the Joint Mission were incorporated into a Time-Bound Acton Plan of Corrective Measures for implementation by the responsible agencies. This Time-Bound Action Plan of Corrective Measures was finalized in June 1998 with the agreement of representatives of UNESCO,ICOMOS and HMGN.
