

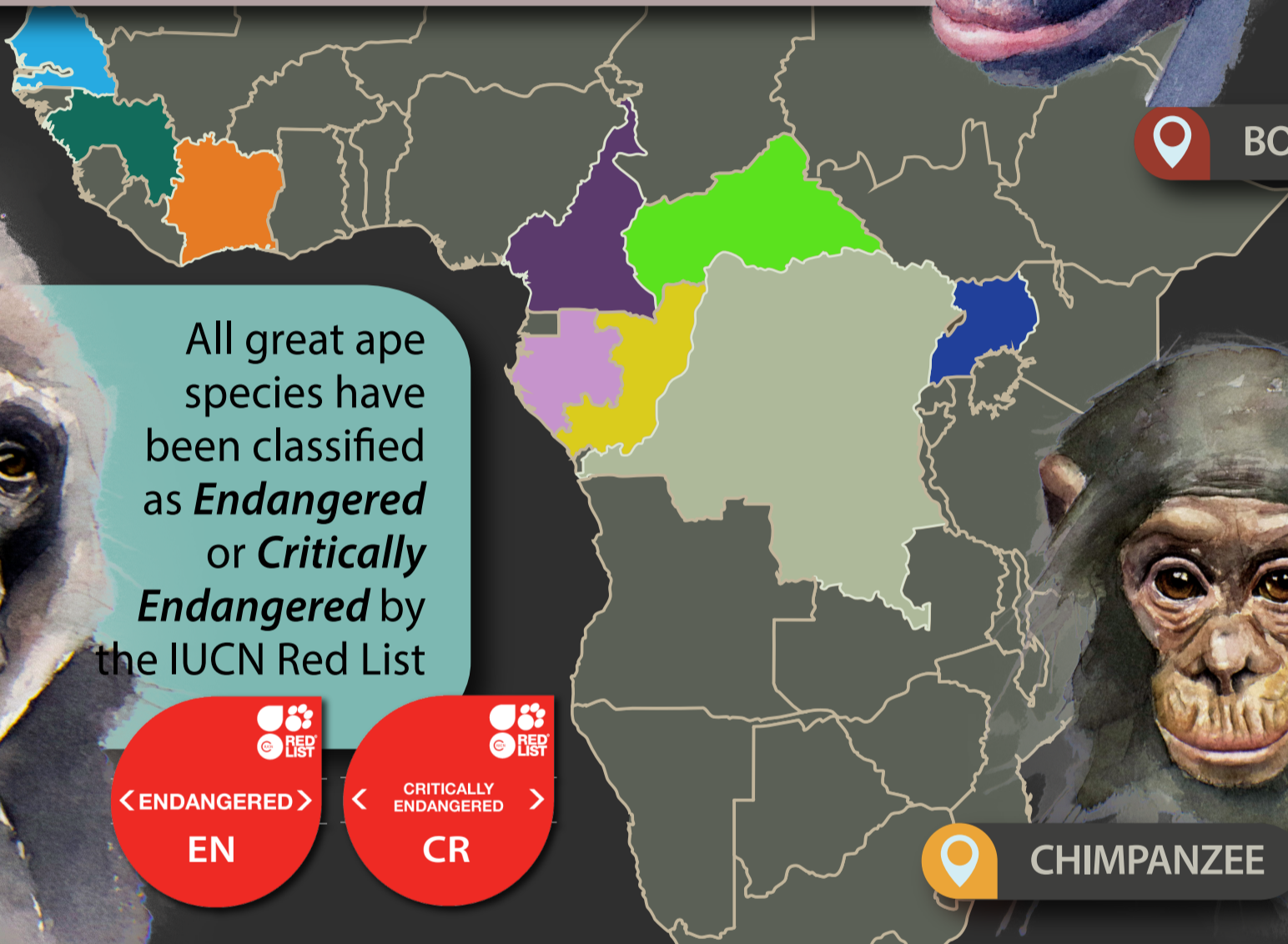
World Heritage Sites

Great apes occur in **16 World Heritage Sites** in 11 countries across Africa and Southeast Asia. Chimpanzees, gorillas, bonobos, and orangutans are representative of the World Heritage Convention's commitment to protecting "the most important and significant natural habitats for *in situ* conservation of biological diversity, including those containing threatened species of outstanding universal value."
