WHV - Bwindi Impenetrable National Park

Bwindi Impenetrable National Park, Uganda

 Natural property inscribed on the World Heritage List since 1994 08/07/2016 - 29/07/2016

Located in south-western Uganda, at the junction of the plain and mountain forests, Bwindi Park covers 32,000 ha and is known for its exceptional biodiversity, with more than 160 species of trees and over 100 species of ferns. Many types of birds and butterflies can also be found there, as well as many endangered species, including the mountain gorilla.



Project objectives: The project aims to mobilize youth schools and local people to become involve

youth, schools and local people to become involved on climate change issues and to raise awareness about the importance to protect the property. The project also focuses on the preservation of the flora and the fauna of Bwindi Impenetrable National Park.

Project activities: The volunteers will be involved in activities such as planting endemic species of trees and they will help in the creation of a fence around the site to keep animals within the protected area. They will take part in awareness raising activities such as workshops, exhibitions, meetings, and festivals. Finally, they will help in the production of a documentary concerning the property and targeting the local communities as well as various stakeholders.
