#### 4.2. Protective Measures

## 4.2.1 - Protective designation (legal, regulatory, contractual, planning, institutional and / or traditional)

The following initiatives have been made by the Government of Azerbaijan regarding the safeguarding the World Heritage site of the Walled City of Baku and its buffer zone:

• The State Historical-Architectural Reserve Icheri Sheher was established in Baku in 1984. From that time up to 2005 the protection and management of the reserve was the responsibility of the Ministry of Culture and Tourism of the Republic of Azerbaijan jointly with the Executive Power of the City of Baku.

• On 10 February 2005, a presidential decree ordered the establishment of the State Department of the Historical-Architectural Reserve Icheri Sheher (SDHARIS), which was placed directly under the Cabinet of Ministers of the Republic of Azerbaijan. The new Department was provided with full management responsibility for the core zone of the World Heritage site, thus replacing the former authorities of the Ministry of Culture and Tourism, and the Executive Power of the City of Baku.

• The decree of the President of the Republic of Azerbaijan, dated February 28, 2005, instructed the Cabinet of Ministers to prepare and submit the draft Regulations for the management of the State Historical-Architectural reserve Icheri Sheher.

• The President decree No. 315 of November 22, 2005 approved the Regulations on the management of the state historical-architectural reserve Icheri Sheher (Annex 5). The department will have its own annual budget and will periodically submit for approval by the Council of Ministers proposals for multi-year capital investment programmes related to the World Heritage site.

#### 4.3. Management System / Management Plan

#### 4.3.1 - Management System

At the time of the preparation of the nomination, the administration and management of the State Historical-Architectural Preserve of Icheri Sheher was the responsibility of the National Committee of Restoration and Preservation of the Monuments of History and Culture, reporting to the Cabinet of Ministers of the Republic.

The institutional framework established under the Presidential Decree of 10 February 2005 united the previously shared responsibilities under one administration, the new Administration of the State Historical-Architectural Reserve "Icherisheher" (SHAHAR). Placed directly under the authority of the Cabinet of Ministers, this administration acts as an independent authority with full legal powers and annually approved financial resources. It has been provided with four subsidiary bodies, namely the Scientific Production Restoration Workshop, the Scientific-Cultural Centre, the Museum "Icherisheher" and the Housing-Communal and Maintenance Service.

SHAHAR has adopted:

- Regulation of use of monuments located on the territory of "Icherisheher" State Historical-Architectural Reserve;
- Authorization to conduct current repair works and organization of supervision in this field;
- Regulation of entry of freight and supply vehicles into the territory of "Icherisheher" State Historical-Architectural Reserve:
- New rules on consent for and control over refurbishment of accomodation (premises);
- New rules on exploitation and preservation of historical monuments/houses by their owners;
- In order to prevent the accidents, natural calamities, extraordinary accidents and to eliminate their results in territory of the Walled City of Baku, including the Shirvanshahs' Palace and Maiden Tower has been established Commission of Emergency Situations in accordance to the Order of the Head of the Administration of "Icherisheher".

In order to ensure coordination with institutions and public stakeholders, two independent bodies have been created according to the Statutes of SHAHAR adopted by Presidential Decree on 16 May 2007. A multi-disciplinary Council/Board of Experts has been appointed by the Cabinet of Ministers. In addition, a Council of Elders representing the local population was appointed by the Director of SHAHAR. The Council of Experts is composed of the main public sector stakeholders: Ministry of Culture and Tourism, Executive Power of Baku, Sabayil District Administration, Academy of Sciences, utilities companies, and other agencies to be determined. Its role is to provide advice on the preparation of the long-term strategy, on the nature and timing of strategic interventions, on the definition of the standards to be adopted to protect the environmental quality of World Heritage property and its buffer zone, on the standards to be followed in the rehabilitation of structures and for new construction in Icherisheher, and on the suitability and potential impact of complex new projects. The Council of Elders is composed of resident representatives and other community-based stakeholders, and provides a formal mechanism to ensure the communication of local needs and the transparency of the planning and management

processes. The Council is consulted and informed regularly about the programming and prioritisation of interventions, and the adoption of development regulations. In addition, it participates actively in the management of the site and the implementation of programs to assist residents to improve their dwellings and the common spaces in multi-family buildings.

The Conservation Master Plan has been approved by the Decision of the Cabinet of Ministers (2010). The Decision as a normative-legal act is the part of national legislation and its implementation is obligatory for the all state authorities. It means that ongoing process of urban planning system preparation of Baku city takes the clause into account. A consulting firm was contracted to integrate the CMP with the Integrated Area Management Plan (IAMAP) into a single document called "Development Strategy of Icherisheher" that includes high-level strategies and an action plan for implementation.

Following the adoption of Order of the Cabinet of Ministers on Establishment of Buffer Zone of Icherisheher (May 25, 2009), the Charter on the Special Legal Regime Regulation of Buffer Zone of Icherisheher has been approved by the Cabinet of Ministers (September, 2011).
