## 2.1 - Statement of Outstanding Universal Value / Statement of Significance

#### Statement of Significance

Malbork Castle is the most complete and elaborate example of the Gothic brick castle complex in the characteristic and unique style of the Teutonic Order, which evolved independently from the contemporary castles of western Europe and the Near East. The spectacular fortress represents the phenomenon of the monastic state in Prussia, founded in the 13th century and developed in the 14th century by the German communities of military monks who carried out crusades against the pagan Prussians on the south Baltic coast. The fortified monastery on the River Nogat represents the drama of Christianity in the late Middle Ages, stretched between extremes of sanctity and violence.

Over a span of two hundred years, since the 18th Century, the Malbork Castle has remained one of the major objects of European fascination with medieval history and its material remains. It also became a sign of the tendency to treat history and its monuments as instruments in the service of political ideologies.

From the 19th century onwards Malbork Castle has been the subject of restoration that contributed in an exceptional way to the development of research and conservation theory and practice. At the same time many forgotten medieval art and craft techniques were rediscovered. Extensive conservation works were carried out in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Following the severe damage that it incurred in the final stage of World War II, the castle was restored once again. Criterion (ii): Malbork Castle is an architectural work of unique character. Many of the methods used by its builders in handling technical and artistic problems greatly influenced not only subsequent castles of the Teutonic Order but also other Gothic buildings in a wide region of north-eastern Europe. The castle also provides perfect evidence of the evolution of modern philosophy and practice in the field of restoration and conservation. It is a historic monument to conservation itself, both in its social aspect and as a scientific and artistic discipline.

Criterion (iii): Malbork Castle, a symbol of power and cultural tradition, is the most important monument to the monastic state of the Teutonic Knights, a unique phenomenon in the history of western civilization. The Castle is at the same time the major material manifestation of the Crusades in eastern Europe, the forced baptism of the Baltic peoples, and the colonization of their tribal territories, which played a vital role in the history of Europe.

Criterion (iv): Malbork Castle is an outstanding example of the castles of the Teutonic Order, which evolved in the frontiers of medieval western Europe. It is a unique, perfectly planned architectural creation, with no equivalent in Gothic architecture. It was built with the use of the rich repertoire of

medieval constructional methods; these were applied on an exceptionally large scale and resulted in the magnificent seat of the Grand Master of the Teutonic Knights.

## 4.1.6 - Comments, conclusions and / or recommendations related to boundaries and buffer zones of the World Heritage property

The buffer zone – even if it was marked out – seems to be an insufficient tool for the protection of our world heritage site, especially its panoramas. It does not allow to prevent the construction of large buildings, admittedly at a certain distance from the Castle, but still being a part of the landscape surrounding the site. The property needs more extensive, more holistic solutions.

### 4.2. Protective Measures

## 4.2.1 - Protective designation (legal, regulatory, contractual, planning, institutional and / or traditional)

Malbork Castle is situated on a peninsula on the right bank of the Nogat river. The whole complex of buildings and fortifications covers 21ha. The Castle consists of three elements, known as the High Castle, the Middle Castle, and the Fore Castle respectively.

The Castle is owned by the Polish State. The Castle has been a protected historic monument since 1804 by Kabinettsordre of the King of Prussia. In the 20th century the postwar Polish Government classified it as an historical monument by means of national and regional legislation in 1949 (castle alone) and 1959 (castle and town). Since 1949 the complex has been surrounded by a buffer zone in which there is strict control over any form of construction. It is designated a national historic monument under the provisions of a Presidential Decree of 8 September 1994. Any form of intervention requires the authorization of the competent national and regional monuments agencies.

There is **acceptable** capacity / resources to enforce legislation and / or regulation in the World Heritage property but some deficiencies remain

## 4.2.6 - Comments, conclusions and / or recommendations related to protective measures

The absence of the specified buffer zone or other, more desirable tool, which the more extensive, more holistic legal solutions would be, may result in threats to the historic panoramas of the Castle.

### 4.3. Management System / Management Plan

#### 4.3.1 - Management System

It is managed by the Castle Museum, an official body created in 1960 by the Ministry of Culture and Art, to which it reports directly. The work of this body is supervised by the Inspector of Historic Monuments of Elblag Voivodate, and the overall responsibility is vested in the Chief Inspector of Monuments of the Republic of Poland.

There is no direct management plan for the Castle itself. However, the Castle and its surrounding area come within the purview of the Regional City Plan for the City of Malbork adopted in 1989 and the 1996 Resolution of the City Council on "The Study of Conditions and Directions of Spatial Planning for the City of Malbork."
