The Extensions to the Gondwana Rainforests of Australia World Heritage Area has recently been added to Australia's Tentative List. These extensions will improve connectivity and simplify the boundaries of the World Heritage Area contributing to the integrity of the Property.

4.2. Protective Measures

4.2.1 - Protective designation (legal, regulatory, contractual, planning, institutional and / or traditional)

Australia has enacted legislation to implement its obligations under the World Heritage Convention. This is provided for under new Commonwealth legislation, the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC Act). This legislation came into effect on 16 July 2000. The EPBC Act ensures the protection of World Heritage by providing a direct link to Australia's obligations under the World Heritage Convention. The provisions of the EPBC Act replaced indirect triggers for Commonwealth environmental impact assessment with direct triggers that focus the Commonwealth's

involvement on matters of national environmental significance - including World Heritage properties.

Under the EPBC Act, an action that will or is likely to have a significant impact on World Heritage values may be taken only if the action is approved by the Commonwealth Environment Minister or is taken in accordance with a management plan accredited by the Commonwealth Environment Minister. In order to obtain an approval, the proposal must be referred to the Commonwealth for environmental impact assessment through either a Commonwealth impact assessment process or an accredited State regime. Under the Act, the onus is on the person who takes or is considering taking an action to ensure that it will not have a significant impact on World Heritage. Substantial civil and criminal penalties can apply for breaches of the Act.

Comment

All World Heritage properties in Australia are 'matters of national environmental significance' protected and managed under national legislation, the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999. By law, any action that has, will have or is likely to have a significant impact on the World Heritage values of a World Heritage property must be referred to the responsible Minister for consideration. This includes impacts originating from outside the property boundary.

4.2.2 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

The legal framework for the maintenance of the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Authenticity and / or Integrity of the World Heritage property provides **an adequate or better basis** for effective management and protection

4.2.3 - Is the legal framework (i.e. legislation and / or regulation) adequate in the buffer zone for maintaining the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Integrity and / or Authenticity of the property?

The property had **no buffer zone at the time of inscription** on the World Heritage List

An **adequate** legal framework exists for the area surrounding the World Heritage property and the buffer zone, but **there are some deficiencies in its implementation** which undermine the maintenance of the Outstanding Universal Value including conditions of Authenticity and / or Integrity of the property

There is **acceptable** capacity / resources to enforce legislation and / or regulation in the World Heritage property but some deficiencies remain

4.3. Management System / Management Plan

4.3.1 - Management System

Comment

As the State Party to the World Heritage Convention, the Australian Government works in cooperation with the state governments in accordance with the Australian World Heritage Intergovernmental Agreement. The Gondwana Rainforests includes reserves in both New South Wales and Queensland, and inter-governmental cooperation includes both a Coordinating and Steering Committee comprised of representatives from the agencies of the Australian, New South Wales and Queensland Governments.

4.3.2 - Management Documents

Comment

Management is coordinated through the Gondwana Rainforests of Australia World Heritage Area - Strategic Overview for Management, 2000 (revisions in preparation). All parks are also covered by publicly available planning documents including management plans, fire management strategies and pest management plans.

There is **excellent coordination** between all bodies / levels involved in the management of the property

An overall Strategic Plan is in place for the property and parks have suitable plans to manage key threats. Management plans are developed for most parks within the property and annual operational plans target specific actions. Every three years condition and management effectiveness is assessed through State of the Parks programs allowing for ongoing adapative management.

In 2007 the Federal Court of Australia made a consent determination recognising the Githabul People's native title rights and interests over 1120 sqare kilometres including the following reserves within the Gondwana Rainforests: Tooloom, Koreelah, Border Ranges, Richmond Range, Mount Clunie, Toonumbar and Mount Nothofagus National Parks and Captains Creek Nature Reserve. An Indigenous Land Use Agreement between the NSW Government and the Githabul People is in operation.
