The Regional office of the Ministry of forestry, JI. Untuk Suropabi No. 7, Air Nona, Kupang 85115, provides coordination especially related to regional administration in East Tenggara Province.

In addition, the Directorate of National Parks and Recreation Forests, Directorate General of Forest Protection and Nature Conservation, Jl. Ir. H. Juanda 100 Bodor is responsible for some aspects of planning and management.

Directorate of Nature Conservation, Directorate General of Forest Protection and Nature Conservation, II. Ir. H. Juanda 15 Bogor, is responsible for indigenous flora and fauna conservation, particularly species conservation outside national parks.
