Cultural property inscribed on the World Heritage List since 1987 15/07/2019 - 02/08/2019

The holy city of Teotihuacan ('the place where the gods were created') was built between the first and seventh centuries AD. Characterized by the vast size of its monuments – in particular, the Temple of Quetzalcoatl and the Pyramids of the Sun and the Moon, it is laid out on geometric and symbolic principles.

Project objectives:

The project aims to develop strategies for working with schools and educational organizations to provide a more sustainable cultural education in the community of Teotihuacan. The project also aims to help educate and inform the population about the various historical and conservational values pertaining to the World Heritage site.

Project activities:

Thematic workshops will give volunteers a detailed knowledge base of the site's history and context on the environmental changes affecting Teotihuacan and other World Heritage sites throughout the world. Volunteers will also be able to take tours in and around the archaeological site to report any deficits observed in the park. This will permit site authorities to later make the adjustments in an attempt to improve the park's condition. Moreover, volunteers will participate in activities aimed at raising locals' awareness about the site and promoting its significance.
