3. Statement of Outstanding Universal Value

3.1 - Statement of Outstanding Universal Value for the property as adopted by the World Heritage Committee

Déclaration de valeur universelle exceptionnelle Brève synthèse

Le site de Butrint, situé au sud de l'Albanie à environ 20 kilomètres de la ville moderne de Saranda, est un lieu à l'atmosphère toute particulière, créée par l'alliance de l'archéologie, des monuments et de la nature dans un cadre méditerranéen. Le site et son arrière-pays constituent un paysage culturel exceptionnel qui s'est développé naturellement au cours de plusieurs siècles. Butrint a été préservé d'un développement économique agressif tel qu'on peut l'observer dans la plupart des paysages historiques de la région méditerranéenne et qui affaiblit leur valeur patrimoniale. Le site associe archéologie et nature ce qui est très rare. Le bien est un

microcosme de l'histoire de la Méditerranée avec une occupation dont les signes les plus anciens remontent à 50 000 ans av. J.-C. pour s'achever au 19e siècle de notre ère. Des sites préhistoriques ont été identifiés au cœur de la zone centrale de Butrint, une petite colline entourée par les eaux du lac de Butrint et du canal de Vivari, ainsi qu'aux alentours. Entre 800 av. J.-C. et l'arrivée des Romains, Butrint a subi l'influence de la culture grecque avec les éléments caractéristiques de la « polis » et une colonisation par les tribus chaoniennes. En 44 av. J.-C., Butrint devint une colonie romaine et se développa considérablement sur des zones marécageuses asséchées, principalement vers le sud, au-delà du canal de Vivari où fut construit un aqueduc. Au 5e siècle de notre ère, Butrint devint le siège d'un évêché, des fortifications et d'importantes structures chrétiennes primitives furent édifiées. Après une période d'abandon, Butrint fut reconstruite au 9e siècle, sous la domination de Byzance. La cité et ses territoires furent placés sous le contrôle des Angevins puis de Venise au 14e siècle. Plusieurs attaques menées dans un premier temps par les despotes d'Épire puis par les Ottomans ont conduit au renforcement et à l'extension des ouvrages défensifs de Butrint. Au début du 19e siècle, une nouvelle forteresse fut ajoutée à cet ensemble de protection de la cité à l'embouchure du canal de Vivari. Elle fut construite par Ali Pasha, souverain ottoman d'Albanie, qui contrôla Butrint et sa région jusqu'à son abandon définitif.

Les fortifications témoignent des différentes étapes de leur construction depuis l'époque de la colonie grecque jusqu'au Moyen Âge. Le monument le plus intéressant de l'époque grecque est le théâtre qui est relativement bien conservé. La principale ruine de l'ère paléochrétienne est le baptistère, un ancien bâtiment romain adapté aux exigences culturelles du christianisme, son sol est décoré d'une belle mosaïque. La basilique paléochrétienne a été reconstruite au 9e siècle et ses ruines sont suffisamment bien conservées pour permettre une analyse de sa structure (trois nefs avec un transept et une abside extérieure de forme polygonale).

Critère (iii) : L'évolution de l'environnement naturel de Butrint a conduit à l'abandon de la cité à la fin du Moyen Âge. Par conséquent, ce site archéologique constitue un précieux témoignage de civilisations antiques et médiévales sur le territoire de l'Albanie contemporaine.

Intégrité

Le bien est d'une taille suffisamment importante (200 ha) pour inclure sur son territoire une grande partie des attributs qui expriment sa Valeur universelle exceptionnelle. Les sites archéologiques enfouis, les ruines encore érigées et les bâtiments historiques sont correctement préservés. Le bien du patrimoine mondial de Butrint ne subit certes pas de graves conséquences des effets négatifs du développement ou d'un manque d'entretien, certaines vulnérabilités sont cependant observées telles que l'augmentation saisonnière du niveau des eaux, la nécessité d'une meilleure coordination des travaux de conservation et des fouilles archéologiques, la croissance de la végétation et l'instabilité de la structure de certains monuments. Des pressions liées au développement moderne, telles que l'extension du réseau routier et l'expansion urbaine autour du bien, sont également à déplorer. Butrint est cependant un excellent exemple de conservation d'un lieu occupé aux époques antiques et médiévales. Le paysage environnant constitue le contexte des modifications urbaines passées de Butrint.

Authenticité

L'authenticité du bien du patrimoine mondial de Butrint est liée à son excellente conservation sur un site où l'interaction entre l'homme et l'environnement est en constante évolution et qui peut être observée dans les monuments ayant survécu, mais aussi dans l'archéologie souterraine et le paysage environnant. Les travaux de restauration et de conservation entrepris depuis 1924 sont de très bonne qualité. Les interventions plus récentes sont conformes aux normes modernes définies par la Charte de Venise de 1964.

Éléments requis en matière de protection et de gestion

Le Parc national de Butrint a été inscrit sur la Liste du patrimoine national des monuments protégés en 1948. À ce jour, la protection et la conservation des monuments archéologiques relèvent de la Loi sur le patrimoine culturel. En 2002, les valeurs naturelles des Zones humides de Butrint ont été reconnues par la Convention de Ramsar. En 2005, dans le cadre de la Loi sur les zones protégées, Butrint a été déclaré « Parc national » sur une superficie de 86 km². Le parc national constitue la zone tampon du bien du patrimoine mondial. Le parc national, dont le comité est dirigé par le Ministère de la culture et des membres du personnel, est en charge de la gestion du bien du patrimoine mondial. L'Institut national des monuments culturels et l'Institut d'archéologie sont en charge de toutes les recherches, fouilles et consolidations des vestiges architecturaux et archéologiques.

Butrint montre plusieurs signes de vulnérabilité. Ceux-ci pourraient potentiellement menacer l'intégrité à long terme du bien. Afin d'éviter que des menaces ne pèsent sur l'intégrité et l'authenticité du bien, le suivi et le contrôle des vulnérabilités sont des éléments essentiels du « Plan de gestion de Butrint en matière d'archéologie et de monuments ». Le plan de gestion doit être en accord avec d'autres plans concernant le bien et le parc national.

The entire nominated area is statutorily protected. In 1948 93 monuments were protected under the provisions of the Law No 586/1948 on the Protection of Cultural Monuments and Rare Natural Sites: this covers all the individual monuments in the area. In 1981 a special government decree nominated the 25ha of woodland at Butrint as a site of special natural interest under the same legislation. There are severe penalties for any action that has an adverse impact on protected cultural and natural monuments.

The inscribed property of 16 ha (core zone) lies within the Butrint National Park. The entire area of park serves as a buffer zone of the World Heritage property. Butrint National Park is divided into four zones:

- Core zone A: 3980 ha with the strongest protection this includes the World Heritage property.
- Core zone B: 592 ha Recreation Zone
- Core zone C: 3081 ha Traditional use zone
- Core zone D: 938 ha Sustainable use zone with the least protection and which act as a buffer zone for the World Heritage site from the neighboring urban areas.
