#### Support to the World Heritage Convention: Draft 1997 Budget

In order to provide an uninterrupted continuation of our collaboration, I would like to provide you with our draft budget for the forthcoming year for the work WCMC expects to be undertaking on World Heritage. Much of this is a continuation of the work we have carried out in previous years, although WHIN is a new and exciting collaborative initiative between our institutions.

The draft budget presented here represents an increase over the 1996 budget and this is for a number of reasons, as follows.

- The number of nominated sites for 1997, fourteen, is high, and there are an additional four deferred nominations to be considered. To ensure a continuing high quality service to the World Heritage Committee, the World Heritage Centre and to IUCN, the budget has been adjusted to reflect this work load.
- We expect that 25th Anniversary will lead to an unusually high number of enquiries from the media, the public and so on. We feel it is important that all activities are adequately funded so that we can accommodate the additional interest we expect next year.
- Provision is also made for additional services, including maintenance of WCMC's database on World Heritage sites, and attending two key meetings: the World Heritage Bureau and the IUCN Policy Panel. Both of these meetings provide a cost-effective mechanism for WCMC to contribute fully to technical and policy issues as they develop, and to maintain close working relations between WCMC, your staff and the Advisory Bodies.

# IUCN TECHNICAL ADVISORY SERVICES TO WORLD HERITAGE COMMITTEE PROPOSAL AND WORKPLAN FOR 1997

In 1996, IUCN received three contracts from the World Heritage Centre totalling \$250,000 to carry out its advisory services role. This represented a slight reduction from \$253,000 in 1995. For 1997, for reasons discussed below, an increase in the level of the contract to US\$323,750 is requested.

An additional element in the World Heritage budget covers the expenses of the World Conservation Monitoring Centre (WCMC) for information services and maintenance of the database on natural sites. This information support function is an essential anchor to providing advice on nominations and monitoring and is treated as a separate contract with WCMC. Their 1997 contract proposal has been separately submitted.

In addition to the functions of information, evaluation, and monitoring, IUCN also contributes in four other areas: communication and promotion, training, international assistance, and standard setting. All of these activities add up to a very demanding role and available resources for the task are being stretched to the limit. IUCN agrees that a maximum amount of the World Heritage Fund should be available to projects and field level support and is concerned that technical advisory services not become too large an item in the overall budget of the Committee. Nevertheless, administration and technical work of the Convention needs to be supported and this increases annually.

For 1997, 15 nominations have been received for evaluation from Mexico, Pakistan, Russia, Yugoslavia, Australia (2), Bangladesh, Kenya (3), Cuba (2), Dominica and Costa Rica. At least four deferrals are also expected to come forward. A total of 19 sites are thus expected to be up for review next year, an increase of four over 1996 and the highest number ever to be handled.

1997 will also be another year when monitoring activities will grow in importance. For the past several years IUCN has devolved many of these activities to our field offices and IUCN members. This has proved cost-effective and will be continued in future especially in light of IUCN's regionalisation process. As in previous years, IUCN is also active in training and there are several regional meetings of CNPPA that feature World Heritage issues.

In 1996 the World Heritage Centre has provided the Advisory Bodies with a new format for budget proposals. This has required a much finer breakdown of projected costs. Our finance department has spent a good deal of time determining these. On the basis of these calculations, IUCN proposes a total budget of US\$323,750 with \$251,000 of this for evaluations, \$26,900 for training, and \$45,850 for reactive monitoring. In addition to this, IUCN, from its own sources will provide approximately Sfr.100,000 to cover costs of personnel and associated costs of both HQ and field office staff. This represents a 20% increase over 1996.

We have not included any allowance for work we may be asked to undertake on new cultural landscape nominations or on the global natural heritage theme study (proposal separately available).
