#### According to article 29 of the Convention

The States Parties shall submit periodic reports every six years on the provisions taken for:

- a) the application of the Convention; and
- b) the state of conservation of the properties inscribed in the List in their territories

#### The **purpose** is to

provide an assessment of the application of the Convention and the maintenance of the values of the properties inscribed;

- give updated information on the state of conservation of these properties;
- 2. provide a mechanism for regional cooperation.



**Europe and North America** 

Partnership with Council of Europe on Section I and Section II for an electronic reporting tool (mutual benefits towards synchronisation, tools and data collection): HEREIN developed by the Council of Europe

- comparative databank on European cultural heritage policies (Phase I, 15 countries)
- Phase II of HEREIN

   – extension of programme to cover region <u>www.european-heritage.net</u>

natural sites: 38


mixed sites : 7

Total: 297 sites until 1998




# Number of States per Region

Results of the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting for Canada and the United States 13-16 January 2003, Los Angeles:

- Canada-US Steering Committee created
- Working groups at Parks Canada and US National Park Service
- Integration of reports on Parks Canada web-server



#### North America: Time schedule

- Phase I: project preparation 2002/03
- Phase II: preparations of reports by site managers January 2003-2004 and review meeting in Canada;
- Phase III: public review of draft reports until April 2004
- Phase IV: joint report US and Canada May 2004
- Phase V: public review of joint report July 2004
- Phase VI: completion, Parks Canada web-page
- **Phase VII:** submission of report to the Centre December 2004

#### **States Parties are requested to:**

- Identify focal points
- Develop sub-regional activities/collaboration
- Enhance collaboration with Council of Europe
- Participate in meeting 7-10 May 2003 in Nicosia, Cyprus

#### Identify focal points:

- 23 States Parties replied to Circular Letter of 27 November 2002 and provided data
- Missing: 27 States Parties have to provide details on focal points for Periodic Reporting
